Orange You Glad | Shared This Recipe!

Love to try new recipes – that's part of what inspired this column in the first place. I've been going from new cookbooks to vintage cookbooks to Pinterest and TikTok to find new inspiration or a taste of nostalgia. But when I seem to keep trying new things and none of them meet whatever invisible and impossible standard I've set for them, I tend to get a little bit frustrated. I went into this one hoping for the best, and I was not disappointed! I've always been a fan of an orange creamsicle, so the cake version seemed like a great idea. The orange cake mix was a bit hard to find, but I ended up tracking one down at Harp's in Jonesboro. It might be a good idea to start this the night before you need it, let it sit in the fridge overnight, then add the topping the next day before serving. This one received rave reviews from the highly qualified recipe testers at the MOR Media offices!

Orange Creamsicle Ingredients 1-3.4 ounce box instant 1 box orange cake mix (plus ingredients vanilla pudding 1 cup whole milk required on box directions - eggs, oil, 8 ounce container water) whipped topping 1/3 cup orange juice Orange zest for garnish 1 – 3 ounce box orange (optional) gelatin **Directions:** Preheat oven to 350. Spray a 9x13 inch baking dish with cooking spray. Prepare your cake mix according to box directions EXCEPT replace 1/3 cup of the required water with orange juice (so if the water is 1 cup, use 1/3 cup orange juice, 2/3 cup water instead of all water). Bake cake according to box directions. Remove from oven and let cool for 15 minutes. Poke holes in the cake with a skewer, about 1 inch apart all over the surface of the cake. Mix orange gelatin according to package directions and slowly pour over the top of the cake. Refrigerate for at least 4 hours. To make the topping, mix the pudding with milk until well combined. Fold in the whipped topping. Spread over the cake and top with orange zest. Keep refrigerated. 

American flag, just as there is a right way and a wrong way to treat the flag in general. As the head of the Paragould School District's JROTC program, Lieutenant Colonel Tim Norman is teaching students both.

Once a year the cadets under LTC Norman's command execute a proper flag burning ceremony on the PHS campus and the instructor said he thinks participation in the event leads many teens to look at our flag with a new perspective. "We started out with five to six hundred to retire at the first," he said. "Then we retired 1,873 in one year. Last year and this year combined we buried 2,043 and I think the cadets involved take a very serious approach to what the ceremony represents."

The U.S. Flag Code says, "The Flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning." When an American flag is worn beyond repair, it should be retired in a respectful manner, and that's what LTC Norman hopes to impress upon his students.

"In a respectful manner," he emphasized. "I do flag education. Then the kids go to the junior high and high school and teach flag education to the others. That includes saying the pledge and knowing the importance of the 13 folds. Then we do the ceremony once a year."

Some of the flags are donated to the school and many are surrendered to students who venture out around town asking for worn flags qualifying for retirement through the collection and disposal program. LTC Norman sees it as a community service and an important step for cadets to get the true meaning of respecting the flag. They have built a fire pit beside their building just for the disposal ceremony, and there is a "graveyard" adjacent to it where the ashes reside.



Not everyone understands the proper retirement ceremony for the flag. "The average guy, most likely not," LTC Norman said. "Regulations say 'in an honorable manner.' There are some who throw them away, not a respectable manner. Some wonder, 'What do I do with this flag?' It becomes a burden. But once we get a flag we go through it all. Sometimes we get a good flag and we keep it.

"Once we have collected the flags, we go through them and fold them and the ones that have one-inch stars we cut the fields off to collect the stars. The kids call it The Colonel's Sweatshop. They cut out the stars and place them in a small baggie with a piece of paper that says: 'I am part of our American flag that has flown over the USA. I can no longer fly. The sun and winds caused me to become tattered and torn. Please carry me as a reminder that – YOU ARE NOT FORGOTTEN! PHS JROTC.' We hand them out to veterans or to anyone who wants one. I carry some in my billfold, just in case. It is one more thing that makes the flag mean something to the kids."

During a ceremony, he said cadets "set up the Soldier's Cross, then the Color Guard comes on and we have the National Anthem, the pledge and the colors are posted by the service flags. Usually the superintendent is there to put in the first flag. After we complete the opening ceremony we've got to keep the fire going. You've got 2,000 flags, you've got to keep it going. The big flags are my favorite. It takes 20 kids involved, folding the flag the right way and getting it all done. Then you let the fire simmer down; it may be a couple of days. You cook it all the way down, get all the remnants out and then we bury them. The hole is one-and-a-half feet deep and three feet long and we make note of how many flags went in."

LTC Norman said anyone wanting to donate a flag can drop it by the high school office or can call the school at 870-240-7721 to make other arrangements. "Or if you know a cadet or a student you can tell them," he said, "or even call me at 870-243-0187 and we will help you out. Like I said, it's a great community service for our kids to be involved in, and it is an important lesson for them to learn."














t has occurred to me that mowing the lawn was a lot more enjoyable when I got paid to do it. As a grownup, it would be nice to have some folding money waiting when the task is done.

I remember being a kid on Wirt Street and watching Dad mow the yard on weekends and I was mesmerized by the marriage of man and machine. Seeing him turn an overgrown lawn into a smooth, green masterpiece made me want to be a part of the act. Then came the time when he let me walk along in front of him while I gripped the handlebar and was able to tell my pals, "Dad and I mowed the yard." I began to look forward to our cooperative effort each week, even though he limited my trips to the parts of the yard that had no difficult spots. Then, when I was about 9, I made a huge mistake.

One Saturday when "we" finished up, I said, "Dad, when can I start mowing by myself?"

He studied it, then said, "Well, I guess you're old enough. We'll let you try it next week." I proved proficient at keeping the lines straight and following Dad's weekly path and it was pleasing to hear him brag on my performance ... until it became my job permanently. Sometimes on a sunny Saturday morning my pals would organize a sandlot baseball game and I'd step away from the phone and ask Mom if I could go and she would say, "Well, you have to mow the yard first."

Mow the yard?! Why do I have to mow the yard? What's wrong with Dad? He's the

best yard mower anyway. But the job was mine and I can tell you now if the Lawn Mowing Sprint had been an Olympic sport I would have most definitely been standing on the podium accepting my gold medal. When there was a baseball game awaiting, I could get that mower up and down the prescribed course in record time.

The good part came a year or so later when our next door neighbors – the Percifulls – asked if I would also mow their yard ... and they would pay me! Okay, now we're getting somewhere; before long I was mowing five or six yards and walking away with a lot of dollars for a skinny little kid. I was bringing in around \$100 a week in lawn mowing money, enough for me to start purchasing my own top of the line baseball gloves, enough to buy about all the baseball cards I wanted, and enough to fill up on 12 cent hamburgers at Dairy Queen when my gang walked there from the ballpark.

Life was good. One day in early August, when school had been under way for a few days, Mrs. Haynes finished her freshman English class lecture early and told us to just be quiet until the bell rang. I sat on the very back row and took out my wallet and thumbed through it and counted \$114 and thought to myself, "I might be the richest kid in this class, maybe even in the whole ninth grade."

It was satisfying to be among the city's elite, those of us in the higher tax bracket, but the high society life seemed to disappear in a flash. Before I knew what hit me I was a married guy with a kid and no one was paying me to mow ... I was mowing my own yard for free.

That's pretty much been the routine since 1973 and I can tell you today, all work and no pay makes Rich an old man. Last month, the belt on my riding lawnmower snapped shortly after I got started. It was a Saturday and none of my friends had invited me to play ball, so I figured I might as well mow. After two trips around the front yard, the belt popped and the mowing stopped and I knew what came next: Put on a new belt.

Sounds easy enough and YouTube videos make it look so simple even a 72-year-old can do it with no sweat, but I'm here to tell you looks can be deceiving. I purchased the appropriate belt and pulled my mower into the garage to "easily" put it on, and that's when the fun started.

You accidentally bump into something at the speed of a greatgrandma and someone nods to you and says,

But with Cindy's help we got that new belt on "easily," and I patched myself up as best I could. Then I finished mowing, and no one paid me. This being a grownup is not all that much fun.



ne pint of blood can potentially save three people's lives, and so far, David Cunningham has donated approximately 168 pints. At just under 22 gallons, it's safe to say David has done a lot of good.

A family man, originally from Kansas City, Missouri, David has been giving blood to The American Red Cross since he was 17 years old. At 56, he has no plans of stopping anytime soon. If you were to see him in town, you might ask about the twenty-plus Red Cross pins on his jacket pocket – or possibly his collection of "punny" blood-related T-shirts. He wears them with pride. After 173 donations, it's nice to have a few souvenirs. He was even gifted a quilt made from a few of his favorite donor shirts.

When asked why he became such a frequent donor, he joked, "I came to help people, but the cookies and orange juice kept me coming back."



Throughout the years, he has seen the need for donations increase and struggle to be met.

Every two seconds,

someone in the U.S. needs blood or platelets. Approximately 29,000 red blood cells, 5,000 units of platelets and 6,500 units of plasma are needed in the U.S. daily. Currently, about 62% of the U.S. population is eligible to give blood, but only 3% of those eligible donate.

"There is no replacement for blood," according to the American Red Cross. "When a patient receives blood, it was given in advance by a generous donor."

David says his faith has played an important role in shaping his mindset, noting he was raised with a "Help when you can and use what you can" mentality. He shared a photo of one of his favorite T-shirts: a black shirt with a red cross that says, "A Blood Donor Saved My Life!" Matthew 26:28.

When discussing encouraging others to donate, David asked, "Would you take a needle for your mom?"

Like countless others, David's mother required a blood transfusion after an injury sustained during a fall. An artery in her arm was severed and she required two units of blood and plasma. In fact, most surgeries require donated blood. It is an absolute necessity, but shortages often affect the patients relying on it.

David said he hopes those curious about donating will reach out and seek answers. Spreading awareness and educating people on the topic is very important to David. "I'm just giving blood. They're the heroes," David said of the American Red Cross workers.

The process is now easier than ever. You can check your eligibility online, earn points, and more. You'll even receive a notification when your donation has been used. Visit redbloodcross.org to find a donation center or blood drive near you or call the local chapter to learn more at 870-932-3212.

Now, Bowski was a sweetheart, but he had a fierce growl and bark, so this kept strangers away, and so it kept danger away. Bowski was my protector, his entire life, and for this I will always be grateful to him.

Now before I get to the next part of his heroic tales, you have to first understand that Bowski was fiercely loyal, but was always up to no good. We had bunnies in our yard several years ago; I was not aware of this, but Bowski was.

I only discovered the presence of the bunnies when Bowski ran up to me (with just enough distance between us for an easy escape), and I saw a baby bunny (which I presume he had just killed) in his mouth! I shouted his name and when I went after him, he swallowed that poor baby bunny whole. Left me standing there, in a state of dumbfoundedness, shock, and a little impressed that he swallowed the whole bunny in a single gulp. After witnessing this, my only reply was, "You better pass that." He did. Dogs are gonna do dog things,



no one can realistically expect otherwise. Bowski broke all the rules, but the one rule he never broke was loving his family, especially me.

Bowski saved over 17 lives in his 15 years. Being a vet's dog comes with implications sometimes. One of those implications is that he donate blood to other dogs in need. Now, Bowski was bad about a lot of things, but giving blood was never one of them; this may be because he knew he would get a yummy snack afterwards, but I'll take it either way. Bowski gave his first donation when he was 4 years old and continued until he was 13 years old.

He never gave more than 2 times per year and was always super pumped about his treato after! Bowski helped to save dogs that had been exposed to rat poison and had internal bleeding, dogs that were suffering from blood diseases to help buy them time until their medications would hopefully work to turn their disease around, and dogs that had a ruptured organ and needed blood to escape death so that life-saving surgery could be performed. Bowski was the hero for 17 dogs.

When I saw that this month's articles were centering on acts of heroism, I immediately thought of all of the amazing veterans. I want to take this opportunity to say thank you. Thank you to every veteran out there for your heroic acts in protecting this country and the freedoms that all U.S. citizens receive because of them.

However, with the recent passing of my beloved wild man Bowski, I also wanted to take this chance to share his story and tell everyone about my hero dog. He passed 4 months ago when his mind was failing him and I miss him every day. He was a bad dog, but he was the best dog. He was a best friend, and I wanted everyone to hear his tale. 
Celebrating Sunivors St. Bernards hosts event

St. Bernards had approximately 450 in attendance at its 25th celebration of National Cancer Survivors Day, which is held each year on the first Sunday of June in the St. Bernards Auditorium. This year's survivor speaker was June Williams, retired educator, author and breast cancer survivor.











ne small, simple act done at the height of the pandemic in 2020 led Dennis Ellzey to give life-saving stem cells to a cancer patient years later.

It began easily enough as the idea fell into place when Dennis, A-State Director and Campus Minister of the Wesley Foundation (a United Methodist college campus organization), was looking for "ways to engage with college students in this new pandemic reality and trying to create opportunities for them to serve their community," he said.

A colleague, Corey Read, had just donated blood stem cells through "Be the Match" (now the National Marrow Donor Program), and she invited the group to consider getting students to join the registry. "We thought it was this really easy, but really creative and genuine way to invite students to serve," Dennis said. "What that meant was they had to fill out something online and were mailed a swab kit. To do the swab kit all you have to do is just swab your mouth and it collects your DNA and they are able to determine if you are a match with someone dealing with some types of cancer, like leukemia. If you are a match, then they call and ask you to consider donating your blood stem cells."

In all, about 10 ASU students who were affiliated with the Wesley Foundation ordered a kit, as did Dennis and his wife, Sarah. "If I was going to invite them to do it, I wanted to make sure I was doing it, as well," he said.

Dennis thought that was the end of it. Three years went by and then he got a call. "I thought it was spam so I didn't even answer the call," he said. "I got an email and eventually found out I was a match for someone who was dealing with blood cancer. When I finally called them back, they talked me through their process before deciding if I wanted to go all the way with it."

Dennis stressed that at any point during the process potential donors are allowed to back out. If you accept going forward, you go through a series of doctor visits, then blood work and a health examination. Finally, a week before the procedure, you undergo a series of injections to ramp up the system to make more stem cells, a procedure done locally through a traveling nurse. Dennis says that the most difficult parts were the injections and recovery right after the actual donation. In fact, the stem cell donation itself only took about four hours and he felt fully recovered the next day.

Everything is provided for the donor, from the doctor visits, to the flight to the hospital for the donation, to the hotel, childcare fees, money you might miss from work, even down to the meals during the stay. Dennis was able to take a guest, so he took Sarah, and they traveled to Houston, the nearest place to make a donation.

Dennis was glad he was able to join the registry, making it just before the cutoff age of 40. "I joined at 39. I was 42 when I found out I was a match but once you're on the registry you can be on until you're 60, you just can't join the registry after 40 (you can join as young as 18 years old). So, technically I could be called again." Would he do it again? "I think so. I think everyone should consider it," he said. "I wish I had known about it a long time ago and done it when I was younger. I would want someone to do it for me."

Dennis does know he helped a woman in her 60s who had a form of blood cancer. "I was called a year ago and they told me she's still alive and that's all they could tell me. The ball is in her court if she wants to tell me (more)," he said.

"They walk you through every step," Dennis said of his care. "It's such a smooth process. They check up with you for about a year." He emphasizes the importance of joining the registry because most patients' family members are not matches, so they count on strangers to help.

Dennis made the following Facebook post the day of his donation: "I was called on as a match for someone in need. I couldn't think of a reason to say no. Timeline was right. Due to confidentiality, I only know that she is a lady in her 60's battling a cancerous bone marrow disease. Her only hope, a blood stem cell transplant. Her match, me. Today, she received my blood stem cells. Please pray for her. NMDP support staff were amazing coaching me through the whole process. Expenses were covered. If you can, are willing to report to a few clinic visits beforehand, can put up with mild-moderate discomfort a few days before and during donation, I highly recommend joining their registry. To get me through it, I just kept thinking, 'What if this was my mom? I would want someone out there to do it for her.' If it was, and I wasn't a match, I would be praying that one of you were. And if more join, maybe I won't get called on again."

DONATIONS THAT GIVE LIFE

Donations that provide an opportunity for extended life to our fellow man include more than filling out the back of a driver's license. They can be as simple as participating in an American Red Cross Blood Drive to weighing the decision to be a live organ donor. Even in old age when death comes, there are opportunities for our bodies to be of benefit to others. Below are three ways you can become a donor.

Blood Donations

The Red Cross provides about 40% of our nation's blood and blood components, all from volunteer donors. Only about 3% of age-eligible people donate blood yearly. Compare that to the need -- every two seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood and/or platelets, and a single donation of blood can often help save more than one life.

In less than an hour donors can give whole blood, a concentrated dose of red blood cells, plasma or blood platelets. The frequency for donating varies depending on what is given. To ensure the safety of both patients and donors, certain eligibility requirements must be met based on the type of donation being given.

Local blood drives can be found by going to the American Red Cross website and typing in a zip code. There are generally several blood drives scheduled in the area, making it convenient to participate.

Bone Marrow Donations

The National Marrow Donor Program (NMDP) develops and maintains a registry of individuals willing to donate bone marrow for patients in need of transplants. The NMDP also serves as a coordinating center for a network of donor, collection and transplant centers across the United States.

Bone marrow transplants safely allow treatment for high doses of chemotherapy or radiation by replacing or rescuing the bone marrow damaged by the treatment. They also replace bone marrow that is not working properly or provide new stem cells, which can help kill cancer cells directly.

To register, donors must be between the ages of 18 and 40 and be able to meet certain health guidelines. Research indicates stem cells from younger donors give patients their best chance at transplant. Joining the registry is simple. Participants receive a swab kit in the mail and return it in a prepaid envelope. Samples are processed and added to the registry.

Should you be chosen as a possible match, NMDP pays all costs associated with the donation. These include

Sometimes you can be a hero to the most unlikely person, just ask Capri Payne, who felt a pull to help her husband's ex-wife before there was even an actual need.

Capri recalled visiting her stepson, Bradley Payne, in the hospital during one of his trials with diabetes, during which he told her, "Mom is going to need a kidney." While his mother, Jennifer Shane, had been diagnosed with kidney disease at the age of 19, there was no need at the time for a transplant, but Bradley had been troubled by a dream.

"I was worried about his number of days," Capri said, noting he instead was worried about his mom. "He said, 'Mom has kidney disease. One day she will need a kidney.'" She said God told her that day she would be the one to provide that kidney, but she kept that message to herself for several years. "I didn't tell Brad, because I thought that is the craziest thought I've ever had. What are the chances, because at that time I wasn't her favorite person."

In 2016, Bradley lost his battle with the disease that had plagued



him, and it wasn't until years later that his mother recalled that he had told her about his dream.

"He told me in 2015 he had a dream that I was going to get a kidney from Capri," Jennifer said. "I never thought about it again until 2020, when I got in the hospital with COVID."

In 2020, both Jennifer and her sister, Deborah Shipman, were diagnosed with COVID and became seriously ill due to the disease. "She died in the



hospital," Jennifer said, "but I lived." Her kidneys were severely damaged, though, and she had to go on dialysis.

In another strange coincidence, Capri and Deborah had been friends before Capri married Dennis Payne and became part of a blended family with Jennifer. "When they both got COVID and we lost Deb, I just started bringing it up gently," Capri said of the possibility of her being the kidney donor.

Jennifer, in the meantime, was overwhelmed as family and close friends came forward to help, including her sister, Priscilla Stillwell, and her best friend, Lisa Brady, but after four potential donors were tested, she still had not found a match.

"My best friend and my sister both put that they would give their kidney if someone else compatible to me would give me theirs," Jennifer said. At this point, Capri decided it was time to be a little more forceful.

Capri recalled going to Jennifer's home with a man from church to visit and pray with Jennifer. "When he was praying, he said, 'God has a kidney on a shelf for you, and I thought to myself, that's my kidney.""

That day Capri broke the news to Jennifer. "Capri told me, 'Don't worry, God already told me. I'm going to be your donor, you don't have to worry'" Jennifer said. "But I was worried."

Jennifer said that day was a turning point for her though. "I really felt then that it was in His hands," she said. "Sometimes the Lord has to get you to that point."

Near the end of June in 2021, Capri found out she was indeed a match. "She called and said, 'Jen, guess what, I'm a match so let's get this rolling," Jennifer said. "Well, it's not that easy."

The good news was that Capri was a perfect match and also had two plus markers, making her a great candidate to be the donor. Unfortunately, Jennifer had to go through several procedures to be cleared as healthy enough to receive the transplant, undergoing 17 operations total throughout the process.

But, finally, the transplant was planned for January 30th of 2022, when the unthinkable happened. Jennifer was again diagnosed with COVID. She made a full recovery, but the procedure was delayed six weeks, and as fate would have it, Capri was then diagnosed with COVID causing another six-week delay.

In a crazy turn of events, as Capri was completing her recovery and preparing once again for surgery, she got tangled up with her goat, and had to call Jennifer and tell her they would have to delay one more time, this time for a broken leg.

On March 30th, 2022, Capri and Jennifer were finally ready to undergo the procedure at Vanderbilt (one of four institutions that Jennifer had been communicating with about a possible transplant).

"I was convinced it wasn't going to happen," Jennifer said. "They kept saying it depends on this test or we're waiting on this result. I was stressed out to the max."

But the surgery happened, and despite a slight complication that required a second procedure for Jennifer, the transplant was a resounding success.

Capri recalled being very calm on procedure day. "Everyone was terrified for me, but I had complete confidence in the Lord," she said. "They said the kidney started working before they even closed her up."

Now, each with one kidney, they are both seeing kidney functions of 90 percent or greater, which Capri said the doctors said is rare.

"A lot of people call us kidney sisters,"





Capri said. "A couple of times at the hospital when people were like, 'Do you know who you're giving your kidney to?' and I was like "My sister wife.' I've had nurses drop the whole chart."

Jen agreed saying, "Nobody can believe that it's my ex-husband's wife. I always tell them, always be kind and always be good to people because you never know when you may need them."

Capri gave the credit to God, who she said provided the way.

"I was born with the kidney she would need to save her life," Jennifer said. "It wasn't anything I did. I have been so abundantly blessed to be the one to get to do this."

additional health testing, travel, hotel accommodations, meals, missed work and childcare costs. Recovery after donating can be from one to seven days, depending on the individual.


Organ Donations

In the United States there are over 105,000 men, women and children on the national waiting list for an organ donation. While many of us are familiar with donations after death, some organs — or parts of them can be donated while the donor is alive. Unlike deceased donors, a living donor can decide who to donate their organ to, helping a recipient get an organ transplant in a shorter amount of time. About 6,500 living donations occur each year.

The list of organs and tissues that can be donated after death continues to grow. A single donation can save up to eight lives and improve over 75 more. While some medical conditions may eliminate an individual as a donor, age by itself does not automatically disqualify. Healthy organs can occur in people as old as the 80s. Even when organs aren't able to be transplanted, they can provide researchers with human tissue to learn about disorders and diseases that affect everyone.

Organ registry is legally binding, even after death. Harvesting the organs may delay funeral arrangements for a short time, but in most cases, do not impact an open casket viewing. Currently, the United Network for Organ Sharing coordinates many of the organ transplants between donor and recipients in the United States. The Simplicity of Fishing BY CHUCK LONG CHOOSING YOUR BAIT



Unlike lures that require the angler to impart some action, bait does the work on its own. It goes on the hook, into the water and the fish reacts. Bait can be live, dead or artificially manufactured. The list can be endless as creative anglers have used all matter of baits to try to fool a fish. Let's take a look at some of the tried and trued baits that have proven to be effective.

Any discussion with bait has to start with worms. Whether nightcrawlers, earthworms or angleworms, these are the baits most of us started with. We dug them in the yard, raked back leaf litter in the river bottoms and grabbed them, or collected them from under rocks, logs and chicken poop. We had a worm bed where we kept a ready supply and saved coffee cans to carry our worms to the ditch bank.

A worm will catch any fish in Arkansas, but they are best for bream, catfish and bottom feeders like drum and carp. Worms can be fished with a #6 hook dangling beneath a float for bream species, but they can also be used on larger hooks and heavier setups on the bottom for catfish and other bottom feeders. One of my favorite catfish techniques in our local rivers is a one- to two-ounce weight rigged with a #4 mosquito hook. This is a great setup for fiddler-sized channel catfish. For bigger catfish like flatheads, put 2-3 large worms on a #2/0 circle hook and drift this rig close to logs and wait patiently for a flathead to engulf the bait.

Worms are readily available at most retail stores, convenience stores and bait shops. Regardless of that, there is something special about getting out in the yard and gathering bait to use on a fishing trip. With our manicured lawns, it has become more difficult to find worms at home, but most every yard has a place that might hold a few. A pile of decaying leaves in the corner of the yard, especially in a damp, shady location might harbor enough for a fishing trip. A few sticks of lumber or firewood can also be placed on the ground in a similar location and attract a few worms.

Another great way to find worms is to get out at night after a rain and search for them with a flashlight. Prepare a small bin of peat moss and dirt to hold the worms until the next fishing trip.

I really like the "seasonal" baits that become available at certain times of the year. Small crawdads can be found in many bodies of water as spring leads into summer. The tails from these make great baits for a variety of fish species. Grasshoppers, especially the large brown ones that appear in late summer, are a great bait for bream, bass and even catfish. It might take a bit of effort to catch them, but these can


be caught and then frozen until an ample supply is available for a fishing trip.

My favorite "seasonal" bait is a catalpa worm. Found on catalpa trees, typically in late June, these black and yellow caterpillars that are destined to become sphinx moths are some of the best summer bait for catfish and panfish. Only available for a short period of time each year, they are a precious commodity during their time on the trees. Gathering them is usually fairly easy, especially with a long pole to dislodge them from the leaves of the catalpa tree. Put a few fresh leaves in a plastic bucket and the worms will last a day or two.

If a fishing trip is not in the near future, catalpa worms can be stored for future use. The worms can be frozen, but I like to boil them prior to freezing. Bring a small pot of water to a boil. Once the water is boiling, drop in a couple dozen worms as quickly as possible. Let the worms boil for about 45 seconds and then remove from the water and spread out on a paper towel, allowing them to cool and dry thoroughly. Once cool and dry, place the worms in a baggie with enough corn meal to cover them and freeze for the next fishing trip.

Processed baits have become very common in the aisles of many fishing stores and are a great option to have on hand for an impromptu fishing trip. The Gulp! line of baits provides options that range from the form





of a minnow to worms or insects, and I have had success with those. Powerbait also has some great options on the market and I particularly like the dough type baits that come in preformed balls for tipping crappie or bream jigs or using alone to catch trout. Catfishermen have long relied on processed baits with names like Catfish Charlie, Triple 7, Doc's and Magic Bait. These stinky concoctions can be found in dough or dip form and are very effective on channel catfish.

One last group of baits, grocery baits, are readily available and can probably be found in the home pantry. Whole kernel corn will catch a variety of fish including trout and bream. Liver, chunks of cheese or Ivory soap have proven effective for catfish. Mini marshmallows are great to add to a hook with a nightcrawler for visibility and flotation. Whichever bait you choose, patience and confidence go a long way to make it effective. Grab some bait and head out to a fishing hole and enjoy a little time along the water's edge. I hope to see you out there!

Drink Plenty of Water

ater is an essential nutrient. It keeps body temperature regulated, lubricates and cushions joints, protects the spinal cord and other sensitive tissues and helps our body get rid of wastes through urination, perspiration and bowel movements.

Water is a part of every cell, tissue and organ in the body. Dehydration is the loss of water and sodium for these essential body functions.

Although mild dehydration can occur any time of the year, when temperatures soar, the risk increases. Besides thirst, it is characterized by fatigue, weakness, a reduction in sweat and decreased urine output. Bladder infections, kidney infections and/or kidney stones can be triggered by dehydration.

Severe dehydration symptoms include dizziness, heart palpitations, confusion, fainting and vomiting. Seizures, strokes or heart attacks also can occur when the body overheats. Medical help should be sought immediately when any symptom becomes severe.

Sunburn is more common in the summer and can lead to or aggravate existing dehydration. Sunburns cause fluid loss through the skin and increase the body's need for hydration. When the skin is damaged, it loses its ability to retain moisture, leading to increased water loss and dehydration, making it particularly important to stay hydrated when sunburned.

While it's a potential problem for all ages, the danger for heat-related dehydration is especially high for children and the elderly. Care should

be taken to make sure both age groups stay well hydrated.

Elderly individuals are at heightened risk for several reasons. A senior's regulatory system — kidneys and hormones — does not work as well, and their bodies have lower water content. They often have a depressed thirst drive, so they don't feel thirsty when they are dehydrated. This is especially true in hot, humid weather, when they have a fever, are taking medications or have vomiting or diarrhea.

The elderly also have decreased taste, smell and appetite, all of which contribute to the muted perception of thirst. Because of dementia, depression, visual deficits or motor impairments, seniors also may have difficulty getting fluids for themselves. Many elderly people limit their fluid intake in the belief they'll prevent incontinence and decrease the number of trips to the bathroom. The medications they take, such as diuretics, laxatives and hypnotics, can contribute to dehydration.

A child's body surface area makes up a much greater proportion of his overall weight than an adult's, which means children face a greater risk of dehydration and heat-related illness. Younger children in particular are very susceptible to the heat because infants and toddlers are too young to ask for what they need and cannot control their environment. Also, very active, older children who are "really into their playing" are at risk, since they may not stop the activity to drink fluids. While continuing their play, they may often be placing themselves at risk for overexposure to the heat.

Keeping cool and well-hydrated can be a challenge in the summer.





Here are some tried and true tips for avoiding serious dehydration.

• Drink plenty of fluids before, during and after time in the sun. Keep cold fluids easily accessible.

• Avoid prolonged exposure to the sun and heat.

• Get acclimated to the heat before hot, humid weather arrives. If possible, schedule strenuous activities in the early morning and late evening hours.

• Keep a watchful eye on urine color. Darker urine indicates additional need for fluids.

• Understand that dehydration can be cumulative. Mild dehydration several days in a row can lead to more severe dehydration.

• Provide wet, cold towels for cooling down workers and athletes.

• Avoid alcoholic and caffeinated beverages. Both of these tend to dehydrate the body. Popsicles, tropical ice treats or frozen fruit juice pops can be tempting ways to satisfy thirst.

• Seek immediate medical help if fainting, disorientation, heart palpations, high body temperature or a severe headache occurs.

Dehydration is easily preventable but can become dangerous if left untreated. Ensure that everyone in your group has plenty of opportunities to drink throughout the day. Nothing ruins an outing faster than someone getting ill because of something as simple as not drinking enough water.

hether flying the flag on the fourth, or on other occasions, there are questions as to how the flag should be flown and how it should be displayed. According to the United States Flag Code there are proper ways to display the flag.

lag-Etiquette

What is considered bad manners when displaying the American Flag?

The American Flag should never be fastened, displayed, used or stored in such a manner to be easily torn, soiled or damaged. It should not be displayed on days when the weather is bad, except when an all-weather flag is used.

DISPLAY

Raise the flag briskly. Lower it ceremoniously.

Never allow the flag to touch the ground or the floor.

The flag can only be flown at night if properly illuminated.

The flag should always be allowed to fall free.

The flag should never be used to carry, store or deliver anything.

Never fly the flag upside down except to signal an emergency.

PARADES

When the flag is carried in procession with other flags, it should be either on the right of the line of flags, or in front of the center of the line.

On floats, the flag should be displayed on a staff.

The flag should be held upright and should not be dipped to any person or thing. Regimental, state or organizational flags may be dipped.

CEREMONIAL

When hung over a sidewalk on a rope extending from a building, the stars are always away from the building.

When the flag is hung over a street running east to west, the stars are always toward the north. When the flag is hung over a street running north to south, the stars are toward the east.

When covering a casket, the stars should be at the head and over the left shoulder. The flag should never touch the ground.

CLOTHING

Is it disrespectful it wear a shirt with a flag on it?

No, there is nothing wrong with wearing an article of clothing - such as a shirt or jacket with the flag.

The distinction is between using the flag itself which is considered disrespectful and wearing clothing that incorporates elements of the flag design.


